Gleaves Influence in the Early Local Tennessee Churches

Researched by Fran G. Nichols

Rutland Baptist Church¹

References of the early influence of Gleaves families in middle Tennessee are found at Rutland Baptist Church of Christ, which was later called Rutland Baptist Church. It was established in 1821 as a mission. The membership gradually died out and in the 1990s the remaining younger members joined Mt. Juliet 1st Baptist Church (Wilson County, TN).

New Hope Baptist Church²

New Hope Baptist Church in East Davidson County began in 1846. The church was a mission of McCroy Creek Baptist Church. It is believed to have started because the Stones River flooded every spring preventing people from attending church, which was on the west side of the river. The river flooded large areas of land every spring until the Percy Priest Dam was opened in 1968.

Gleaves among the 30 charter members listed in the original minutes: Jas. R. Gleaves, Thomas Gleaves, Robert Gleaves, John R. Gleaves, Edmond Gleaves and Eliza Gleaves. Although the wives of these men are

not listed in the first minutes as Charter members, they are listed along with their daughters in a later membership roll.

In 1871, James T. Gleaves, son of Absalom Gleaves, donated one half acre of land to combine with land donated by Wm. E. Hagar to New Hope Baptist Church. James T. Gleaves was never a member but a number of the charter members were his relatives. The present day church is still located on this land.

"EXCLUDED" could have meant:

1. a long absence
2. a member's request for removal
3. joined a church of another faith
4. profane language

5. guilty of partying or dancing
6. other personal activities or indiscretions (excessive use of ardent spirits)

7. failure to appear before the church (to answer a charge)

8. moving away from the community

(April 1860: "if any member shall move to another part of the country and remain without a letter from church for 6 months, church shall consider such member excluded from her fellowship")

Baker's Grove Baptist Church³

As settlements grew in population, local churches sponsored outreach churches by sending charter members and assisting financially until the new church was self-supporting. Baker's Grove Baptist Church, which was 3.7 miles east of New Hope, started with 26 charter members in 1884. At least 16 or more were former members of New Hope. Early members were James R. Gleaves by baptism Sept 1890. He was dismissed by letter May 1897; George Durward Gleaves – baptized 1899; Mary F. Gleaves – By constitution Feb 10, 1884; Mary A. Gleaves by Petition – March 15, 1884.

Baker's Grove was forced to move when the Percy Priest Dam was built. The previous land now belongs to the U.S. Corp of Engineers. Church is still in existence about a mile from original spot.

Mt. Juliet Church of Christ⁴ (Wilson County, Tennessee)

Although no one is sure of the exact date of this church's beginning, the deed for the original plot was signed in 1899. But all estimates place the beginning several years earlier. Apparently the people were not very prompt in recording transactions and in their efforts to be unworldly had no secretary or church clerk.

The church probably had its beginning in 1891 or 1892. A copy of the "Mt. Juliet Messenger" dated August 15, 1944, contains articles by Sister R. V. Cawthon and Brother J. N. Carver listing the date as 1891.

Annie Grigg said the building of the Mt. Juliet Church came about in this way. "Her father, J. W. Grigg, and Mrs. Annie Gleaves were riding horseback from church one Sunday when Brother Grigg said, "Why don't we build a church here in Mt. Juliet?" Sister Anne, wife of Jesse Gleaves, said, "We will give the little thicket down by the creek if you will raise the money." So the little thicket became the location not only for that first church, but for at least two other houses of worship, for that little half acre plot is almost directly in front of our present building where the new auditorium is located.

In all probability, it will continue to serve as a location for a Church of Christ for years to come. The language of the Gleaves deed written by Brother J. W. Grigg says, "J. H. Gleaves and wife, to the Church at Mt. Juliet, for and in consideration of the deep abiding interest we feel in the cause of Christ and the great love we bear the Church of Christ at Mt. Juliet, we, **Jesse H. Gleaves and wife, Annie Gleaves**, do transfer and convey to said Church of Christ at Mt. Juliet, Tennessee forever the boundaries follow one-half acre more or less. The above remains in full force and effect only so long as said property ceases to be used it shall revert to Jesse H. Gleaves, his wife and heirs." Brother Jonah Carver said the deed was not recorded until 1899 when the Gleaves sold out and moved to Texas.

It is not known who built this first house of worship. It was a one-room structure about 25 by 45 feet, weather-boarded, painted white, with double doors in the front and a single door in the rear. There were four tall narrow windows on each side and there was a flue for a stove in the middle of the building. It was built on stone pillars, as few buildings had solid foundations in that day.



Church records (1925) show Mrs. Jessie Harrison Gleaves, a Charter member as the only Gleaves attending this church. However, early written records were not kept and it seems logical that at least her children would have attended with her.

Pleasant Grove United Methodist Church⁵

Pleasant Grove was formed out of a consolidation of Alford's Camp Ground and Murray's Chapel. The present sanctuary, a one room frame structure was erected in 1870. One of the Trustees in Trust was Thomas Harvey Gleaves. This original building is still in use with some modern improvements such as electricity and running water. It is located in Mt Juliet, Wilson County, TN and continues to use the original alter.

Goodlettsville Cumberland Presbyterian Church⁶

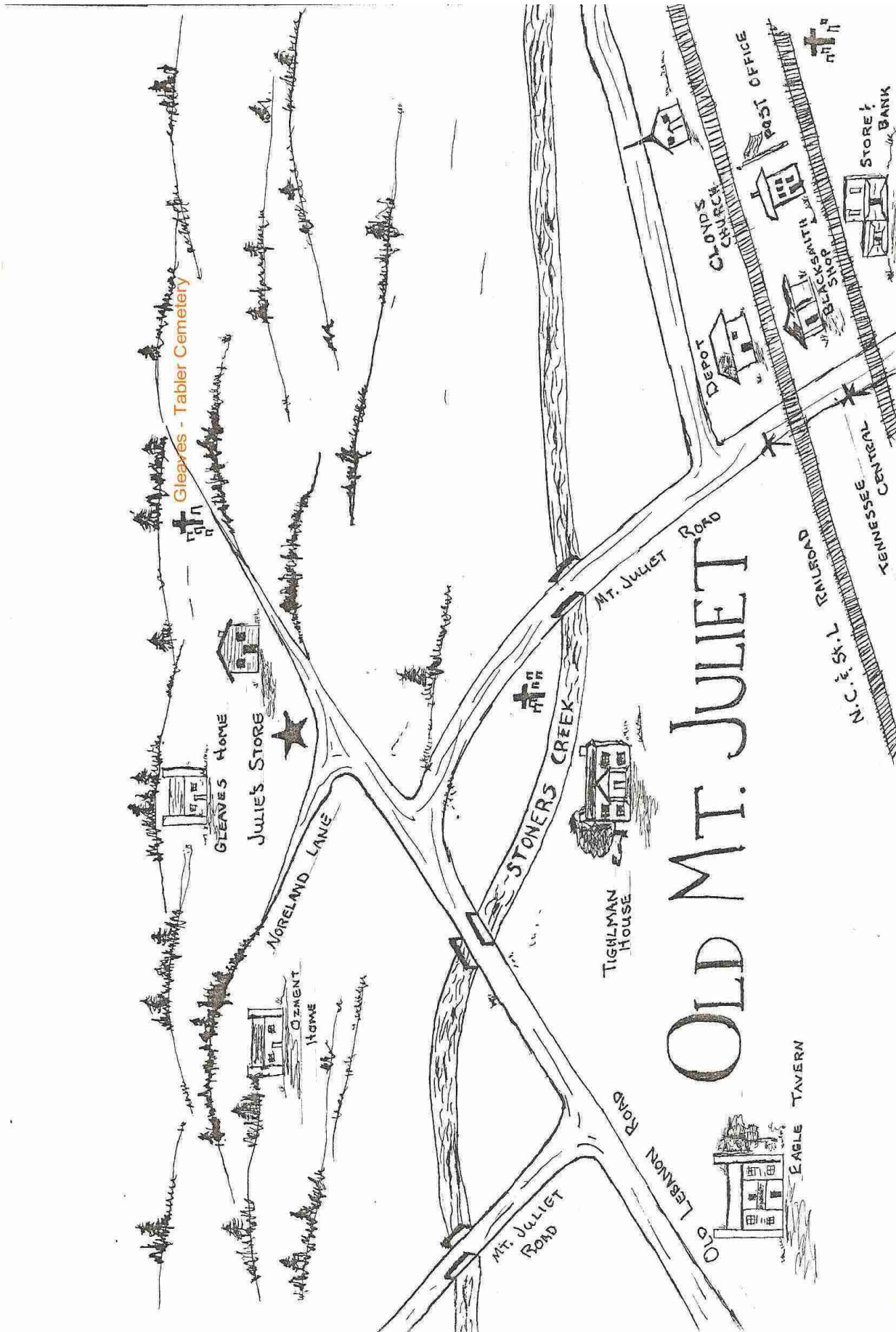
This church in northeast Davidson County, TN was established in 1843. It was an outgrowth of the great Revival meeting during 1799 in Kentucky and Tennessee. It was organized near Mansker's Creek and was originally known as Mansker Creek Congregation. In January 1848, the church moved to the present location. The present edifice was built in 1902. The congregation has remained active for more than 160 years.

The "Register of Infant Baptisms" list four children of George & Fannie Gleaves. Mattie Hamblin Gleaves, Mary Dean Gleaves, Wallace Ambrose Gleaves and Lizzie Josephene Gleaves were baptized 13 Nov 1881.

Wallace Gleaves was appointed as usher 02 Jul 1900. He is believed to be the Wallace Ambrose Gleaves listed with his sisters in 1881.

Under Marriages George W. Gleaves to Fannie Hamblin is dated 6 Jun 1872. Mrs. G. W. Gleaves (Fannie Hamblin) is listed as a member of the Woman's Home and Foreign Mission Society in 1887.

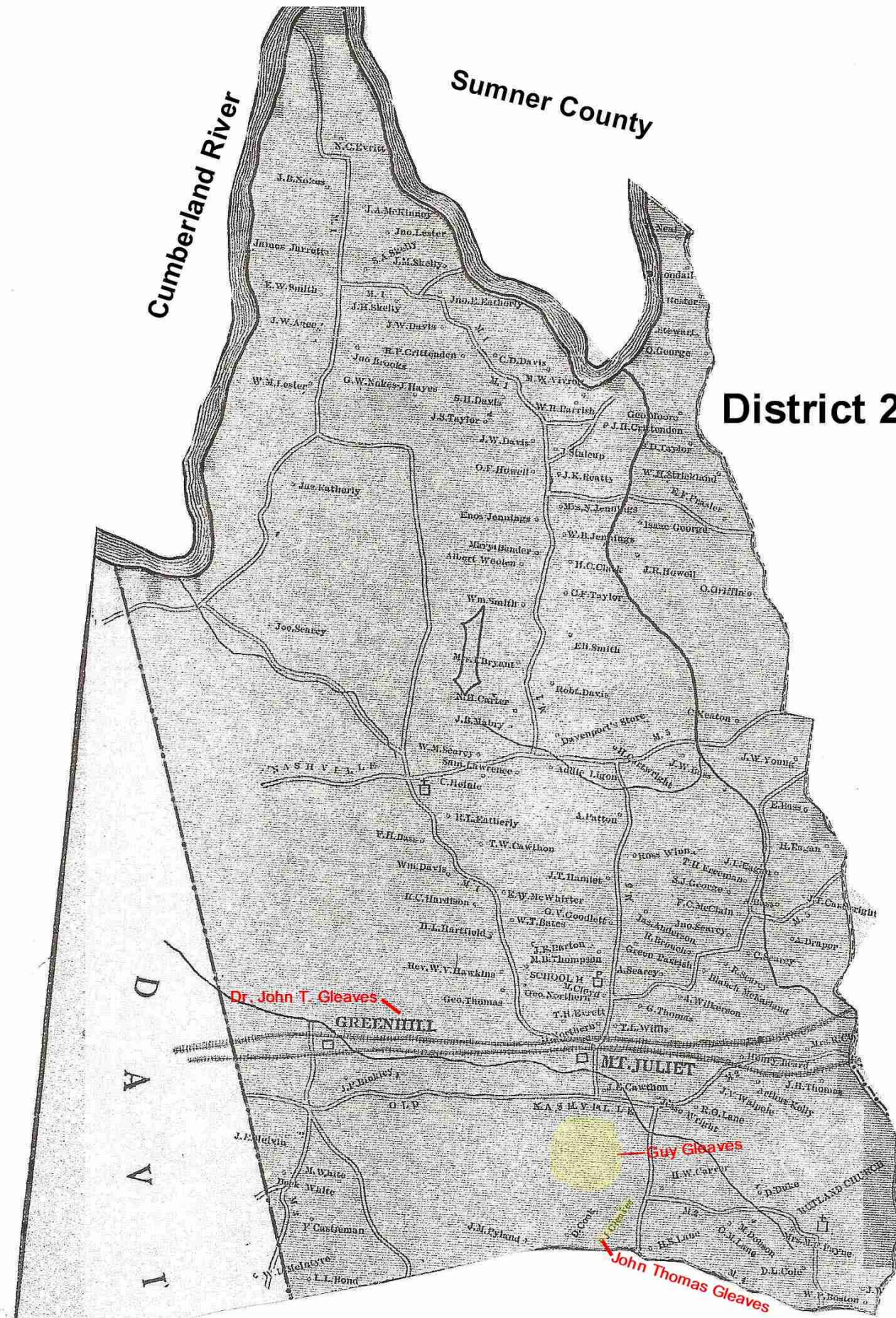

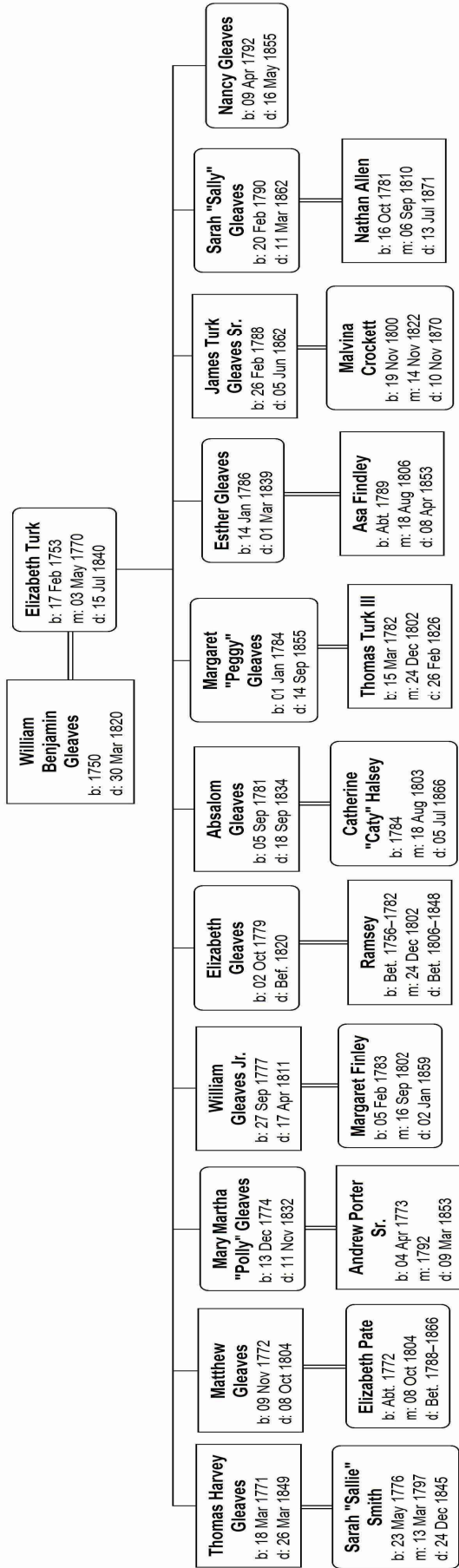

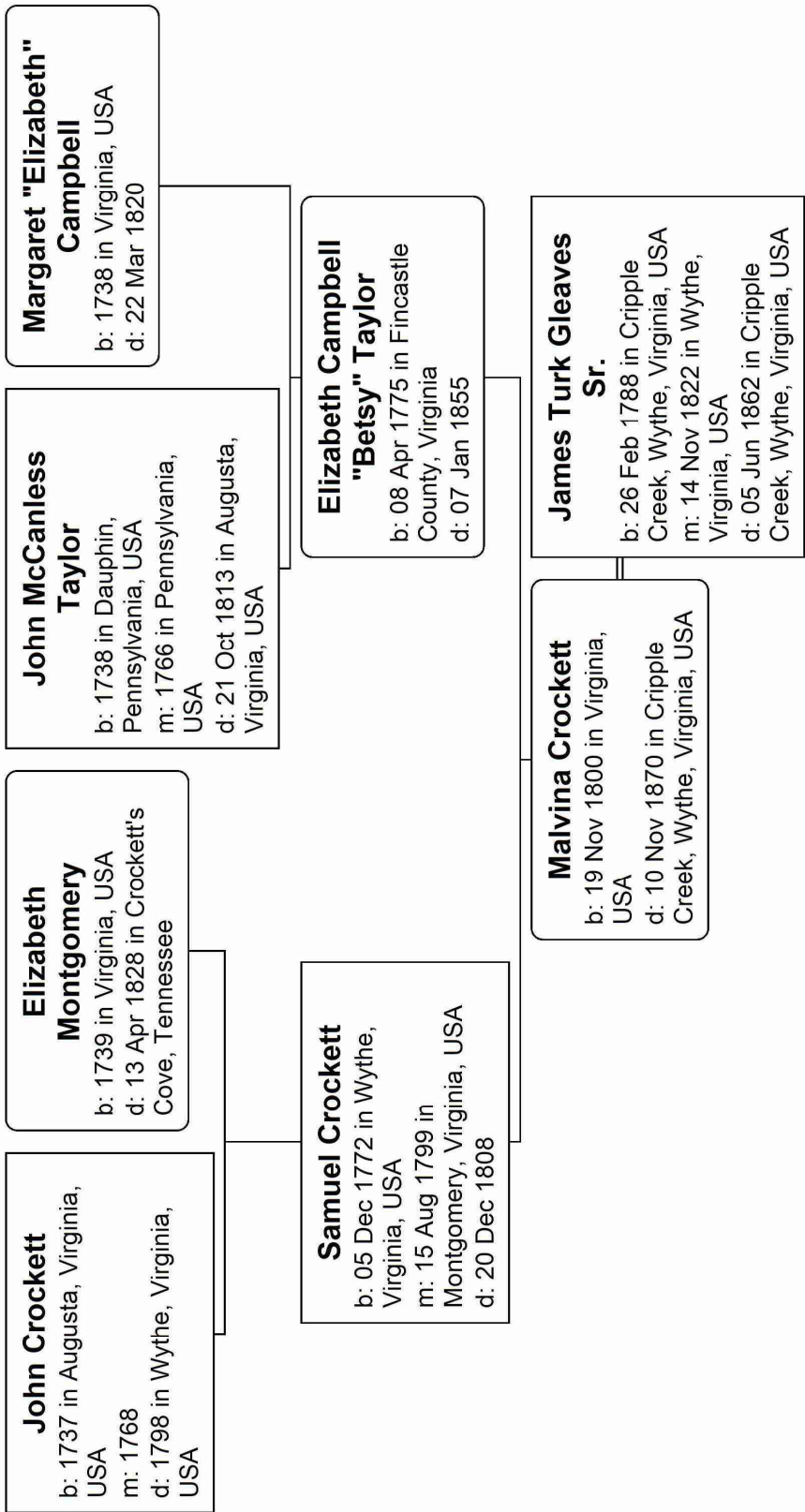

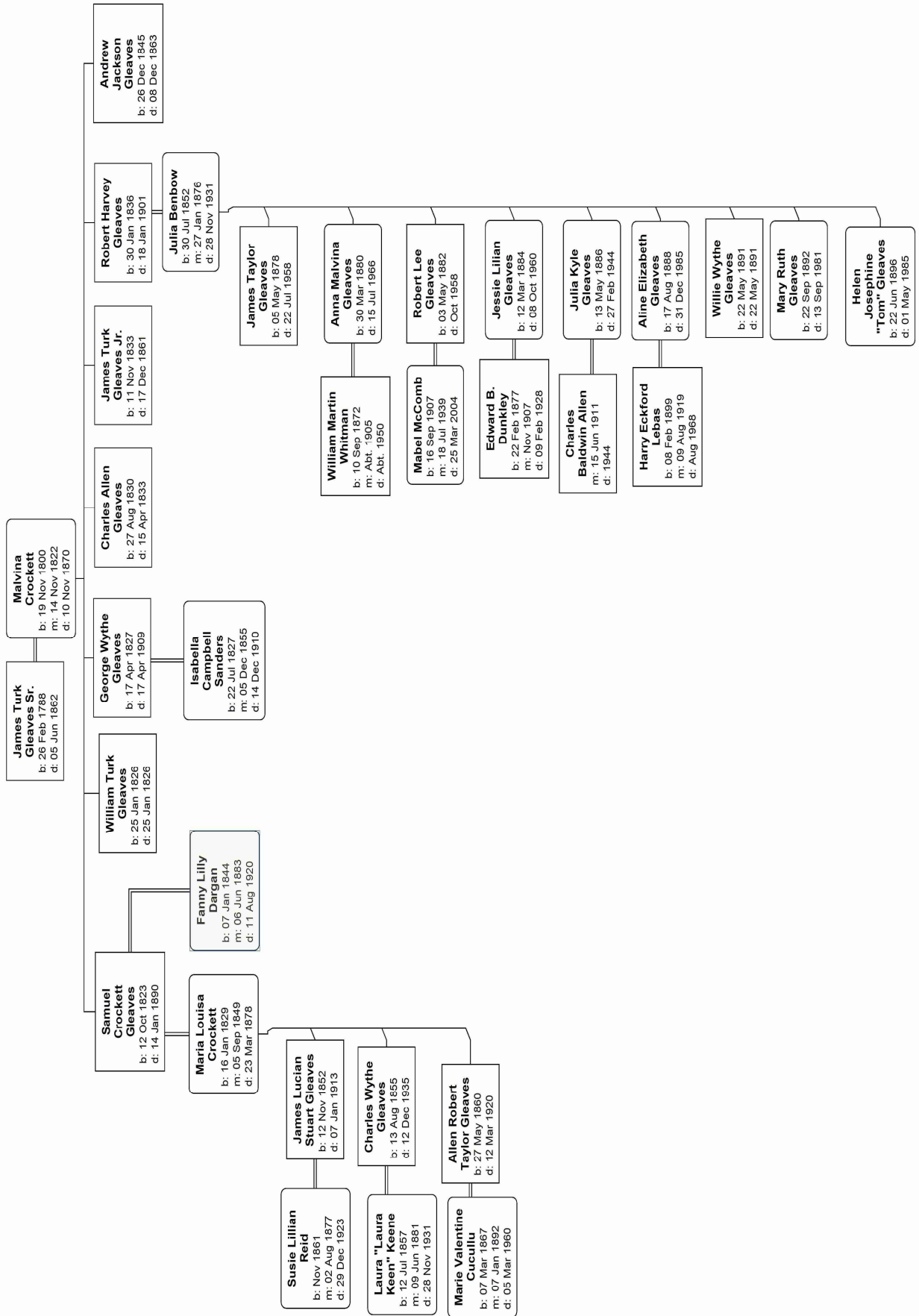
**Descendant Chart for
William Benjamin Gleaves**



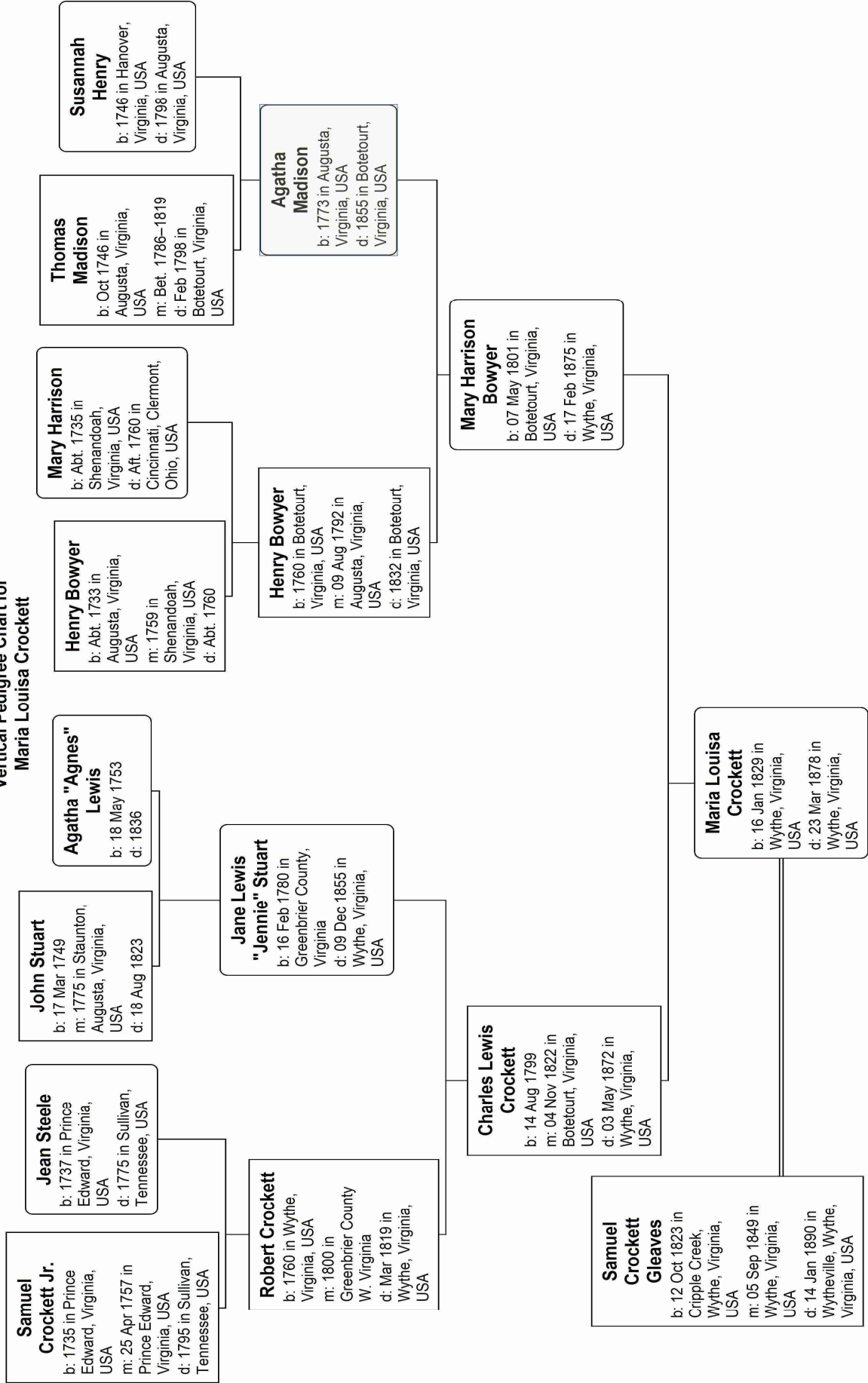
**Vertical Pedigree Chart for

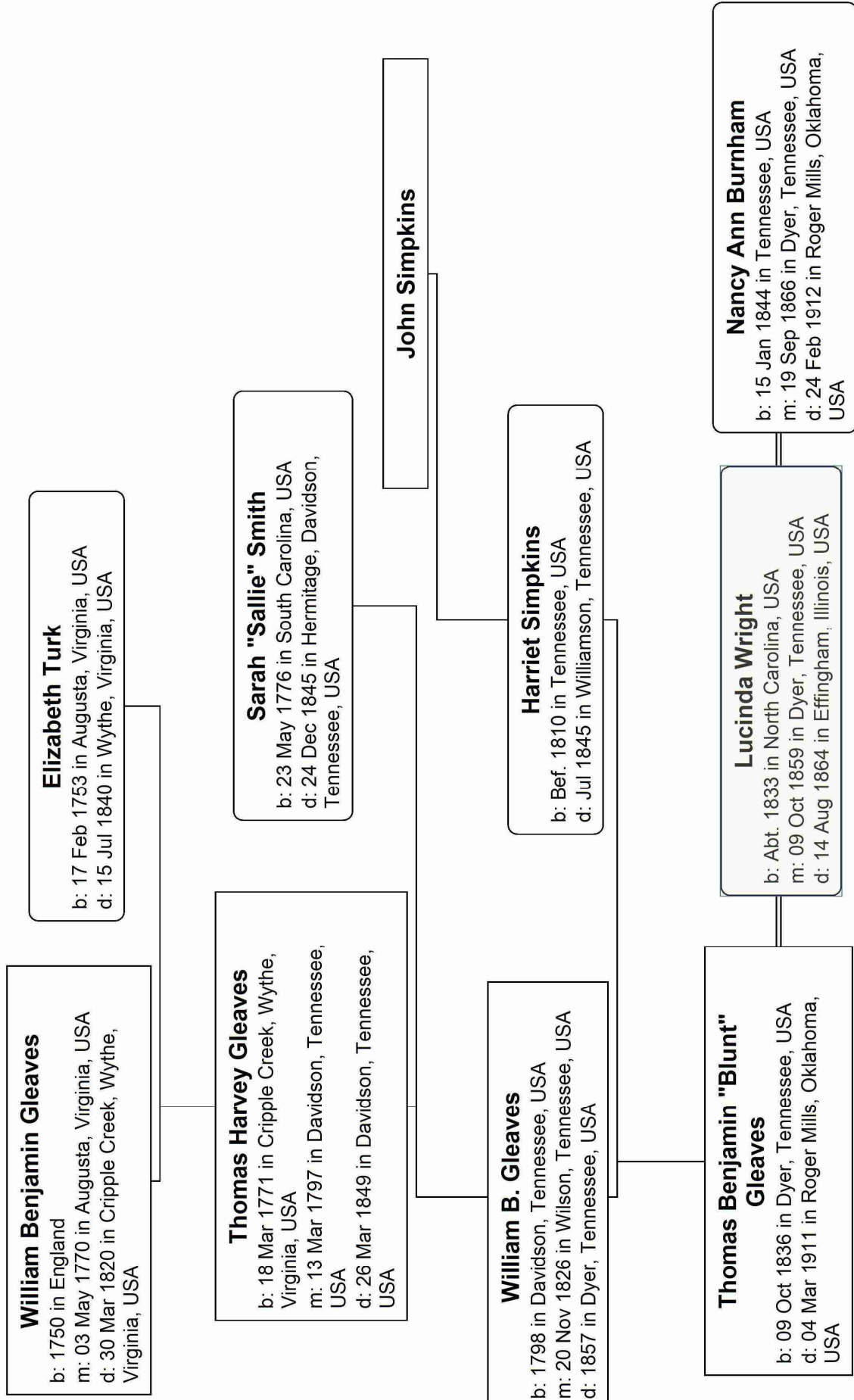

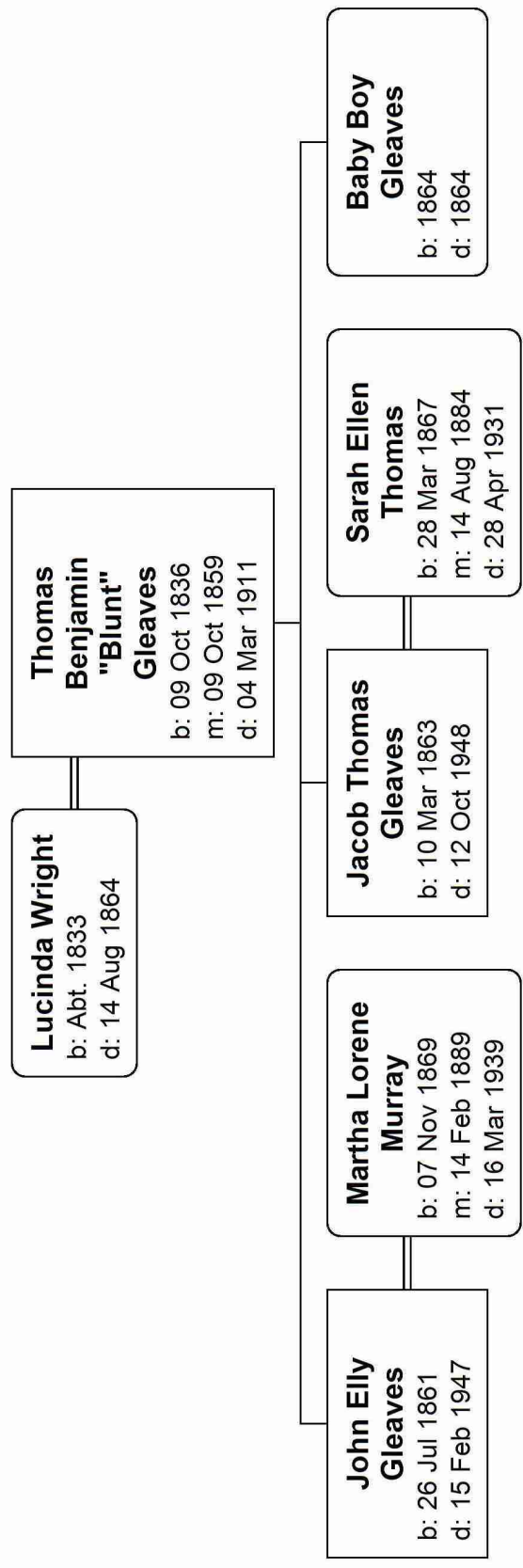

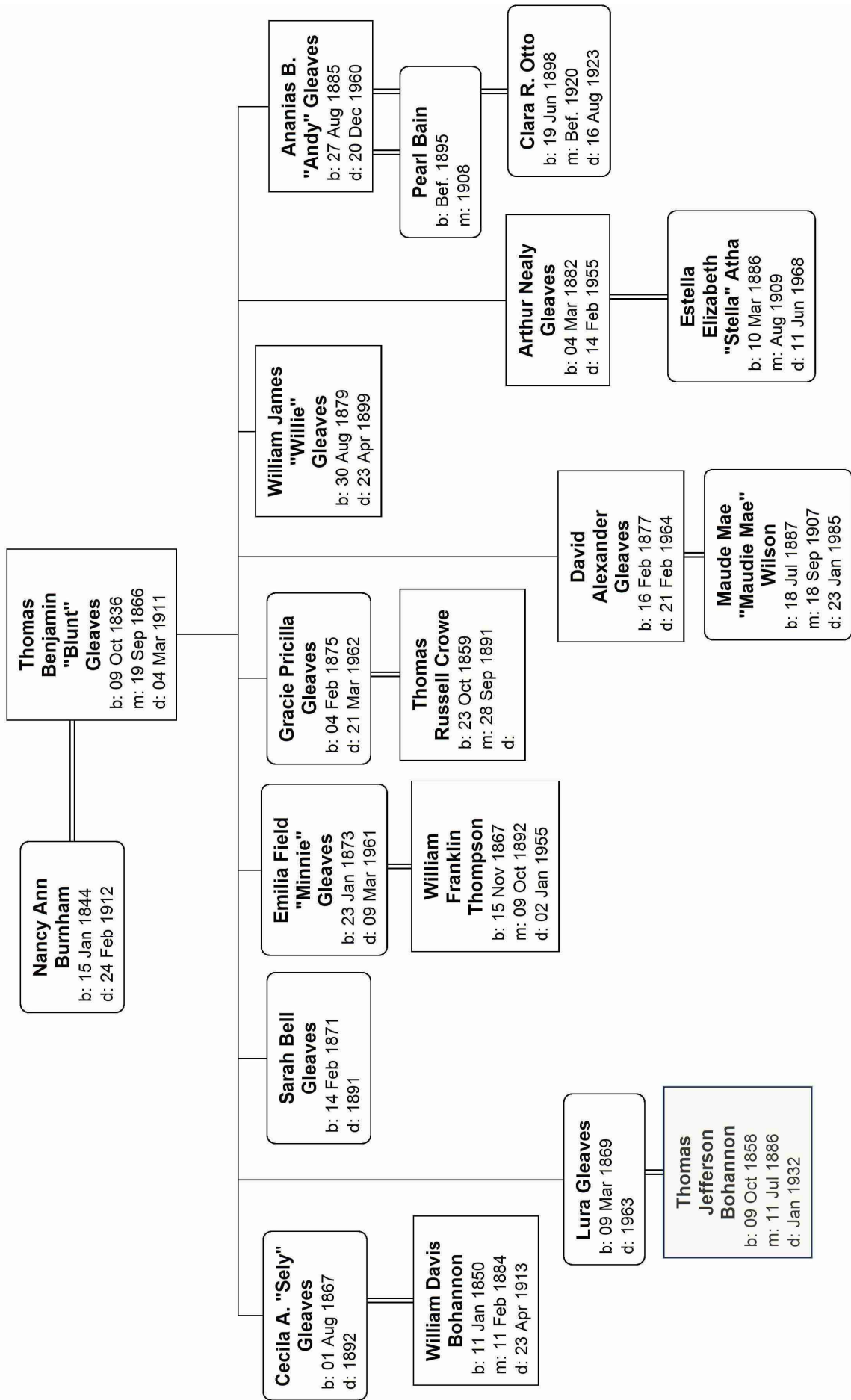
**Vertical Pedigree Chart for

History:

In the spring of 2004 when an elderly aunt died, the original deed to this old cemetery was found. It was started in 1919 after an uncle died at 3 years of age.

The deed showed that the cemetery was much larger than actually fenced. At this point Owen Gleaves began the task of researching the deed at the County Courthouse, notifying the adjoining property owners and preparing to enlarge the cemetery. He worked on paperwork and details for months. Working alone he cut down trees, burned brush, moved rocks and prepared the soil. A cousin helped him purchase additional fencing which was installed after he had cleared the land.

In December of 2007, 200 daffodil bulbs were set out. We had to wait until December because the weather was too warm to set them out earlier. We have had very little winter here in Middle Tennessee so it is a surprise that any of them are blooming.

Alice Hix prepared a Plat showing all present graves and future grave sites. This was given to the local Funeral Home, Bond Memorial. The deed states that only direct relatives of P.M. Carver may be buried in this cemetery. Our parents, grandparents and great grandparents, aunts, uncles, a nephew and a sister are buried here and we shall follow

them. Owen Gleaves says since he plans to spend a while in this cemetery, he wants it to be beautiful and peaceful. It is extremely beautiful when the dogwood trees bloom in the spring.

The old Deed also identified the small cemetery located next to this one which had been taken over by the forest. Owen also cleaned this one up and re-fenced it. We had always been told that it was a slave cemetery but it is actually occupied by the original land owners. We also researched this family and found distant relatives but no one living locally.

This cemetery has touched others besides immediate family. The salesman, who sold us the extra fencing and supervised its placement, worked with us while he was waiting for the body of his oldest son, a Marine, to be returned from Iraq. He had tears rolling down his cheeks as he worked. He said if he did not work, he could not bear the pain. It took several weeks for his son's body to arrive home.

History:

Henry Thomas Jenkins (b Dec 1827 – d. 1879) married Martha Ann Virginia Gleaves on Dec 27, 1853. He purchased his farm on Jan 1, 1855 from Sam Huguley in the 25th District of Wilson for \$1000.00 consisting of 102 acres. (Book A-2 page 350, recorded Jan 1, 1855) “Beg. At a sycamore tree in the N. branch of Suggs Creek in William Jenkins’ line, thence W. 97 poles to a stake in Joseph Rutland’s and Isaac Carver line thence N. 137 poles....thence E. to center of the creek...following center of creek to beginning.”

They apparently lived on this farm the remainder of their lives. He died before Martha Ann Virginia and was buried in an area between their home and a public road on the West. Upon her death in 1882 Martha Ann was buried beside him. In later years all that remained were a tree and a few broken white marble stones. Beginning with that in 1995 Matthew E. Shreeve, son of Bill & Peggy Shreeve and stepson of Houston Hagar, began his quest to become an Eagle Scout. (Houston is a great grandson of Henry Thomas and Martha Ann Virginia Gleaves Jenkins). He secured the services of a dowser with a divining rod (Mr. Marchetti to pinpoint the exact grave location. Mr. Marchetti works with the Mt. Juliet Funeral Home digging graves). The fence rock was hauled from the Hagar farm to the gravesite. Monument pieces were then embedded in cement.

On June 12, 1995, the Hagar family held a dedication ceremony, crediting the Eagle Scout leadership project (Troop #263). Matt Shreeve attained his Eagle Scout Badge on Dec 16, 1995. Tragically Matt was killed on Interstate 40 in Putnam County while returning home from College in Nov 1997.

By 2007 the rock fence had been damaged by vandals or children’s play. Hilda H. Barnes, a great-granddaughter then installed a black metal fence along with a small informational marker in the center.

This small cemetery is located within an upscale sub-division at 804 Austin Way just off Guill Road, Mt. Juliet, Tennessee. An ingress and egress easement to the cemetery is registered in the Office of the Register in Lebanon, Tennessee in Deed Book 147, page 367. Also see Deed Book 870, p. 2311 Mark T. Brown Construction Inc. to Imran H. Rahmani & wife.

Driving north from the Hotel or I-40

First creek runs under the road- That is Stoner's Creek where Absalom Gleaves first purchased land in Wilson Co. All the land to your left belonged to Guy Gleaves.

1. Next Red Light after Creek is the Old Stage Coach road now called Old Lebanon Dirt Road. Guy Gleaves home, store and first high school and family cemetery located to your left.
2. Watch as the beautiful Mt. Juliet Church of Christ comes into view on the left. First land donated by Jesse Gleaves.
3. Guy Gleaves owned all the way to Division St., which is where you turn left to go to the meeting room.

This road was the Old Railroad Bed for the Tennessee Central and later the NC&StL. (Nashville Chattanooga & St Louis Railroad)
